





3. This is an ok TV, I guess:

This is a work of street art, with visual cues to suggest depth when viewed from a certain angle:

Here's how it looks from above, with most of the background cropped:



Notice how the leg was drawn very very long so that when viewed from an angle, it looked like it was projecting out of the street. One can verify that this is the correct fronto-parallel view of the street by observing that the drain in the top left of the image is relatively square, even though this was not the reference that was used to compute the homography.
